



Summarized Minutes of the Board Meeting

on October 16, 2017 — Bart Goldberg, Secretary

Attendees: Lynn Ankney, Howard Silver, Adrienne Chan, Colleen Kenny, Anna Sobor, and Bart Goldberg

The Board meeting commenced at about 8:30 p.m.

Treasurer's Reports: The Treasurer's Reports for the month of September were unanimously approved.

Membership: Plans on how to reach the members that have not yet renewed were discussed, and for the future exploring to see if we can possibly offer an autorenewal system. We were pleased that about 275 have already paid their dues electronically this year which is considerably more than used that method last year.

Outside Meeting: Lynn Ankney and Anna Sobor reported on an initial meeting with the Gidley Management Group and others regarding a possible business association for our area. They also reported on the status of The

Point at Six Corners development at the corner of Irving Park and Milwaukee that is still yet to break ground. A meeting concerning that project has been postponed by the developer.

Zoning: Howard Silver updated us on a few ongoing zoning issues, including the possible development of the church property located at 4047 N. Keeler.

Holiday Party: We have been investigating the possibility of having our annual holiday party at a different location this year. We are still in the process of evaluating costs and will make a decision soon.

Miscellaneous: Our website, the newsletter, the above ground planters, and the greenspace program, were all also discussed.

The meeting adjourned at about 9:30 p.m.

OIPA GENERAL MEETING REPORT



Summarized Minutes of the General Meeting

on October 16, 2017 — Bart Goldberg, Secretary

Attendance:

Approximately 28 good souls were at the meeting, which was a fine turnout in light of the postponement from the week before. I attribute the good attendance to a combination of to the fine speaker we were presenting and the provision of cookies once again. (Many thanks to Fannie's Bakery at Milwaukee and Montrose for the tasty selection). The meeting was postponed last week due to a conflict with the Cubs playoff game and the Bears on Monday Night Football. President Ankney reached out to the Cubs to remind them that we had scheduled this meeting some time ago, and they were courteous enough to reschedule for the afternoon. The Bears tried to accommodate us, but the Commissioner had to clear it with the President and he was unavailable on the golf course, so we moved it. There were a couple of new attendees to welcome at this meeting: Mike Abbott, who resides on Kenneth, and Kate Kane of the 3700 block of Kostner. Please consider vourselves welcomed! President Ankney commenced the meeting at 7:08 p.m.

Board Elections: The membership elected new officers for OIPA at this meeting and President Ankney wisely devoted very little time to this, since there were no contested elections. A hand vote was taken and Lynn Ankney (President) Howard Silver (Treasurer) Bart Goldberg (Secretary) were all re-elected, and Adrienne Chan was elected as our new VP. There was one nay vote against the slate, but it is our policy to not report on this so as not to discourage a free election. However, Wendy Jo, you should know that we are reconsidering that policy for future elections.

Committee Reports and Announcements:

Meredith O'Sullivan updated us on membership and noted that as is normally the case this time of the year we have a lot of stragglers that have yet to renew their annual membership. People, we need you!

Colleen Kenny updated us on advertising (which seems to be going quite well). It was good to hear that we now have some more advertisers on our website.

Adrienne Chan discussed the new round of banner sales that are about to begin. The cost is \$500 for two years to fly your beautiful Old Irving Park banner. She pointed out that you do not have to be a business or an organization to purchase one and be identified on it. For example, a family could buy one, or a block or other group of neighbors. This could be a great way to honor that truly special dog of yours too! (I hope my wife does not read this, as she would really do it).

A representative gave us an updated report on the City of Chicago meeting concerning the Cook County Towing company. It seems that many people are very disturbed by the actions of this company. Some of these include very reckless driving, noise complaints, and parking towed cars on Milwaukee Ave, and now their activities at their new location on Knox Avenue just south of Montrose. At the City meeting, the Business Affairs department set some new restrictions on Avondale Collision on Milwaukee Ave to help address this problem. We will keep you posted.

Main Speaker: State Representative Jaime Andrade, Jr.

Representative Andrade has been the State Representative for the 40th district (which includes nearly all of Old Irving Park) for four years now, and while he has been at meetings before, this was the first time we have had him as the featured speaker. It was long overdue!

In the first part of his remarks Representative Andrade stressed that he sees himself as being primarily a service oriented representative (as opposed to a legislative specialist). His considerable skills in providing constituent services were honed from over 20 years of service with Alderman Mell's office. He discussed two big projects in our community that he has is particularly proud of. The first was the new playground at Independence Park, where he not only was instrumental in getting it built, but insisted on making it fully handicapped accessible. The second was the new public library being built at 4022 N. Elston. This incredibly important project was approved in record time and he said that they should break ground on it this spring. He said that the new big project in his crosshairs is remedying the filthy viaducts under the Blue Line. This includes the one on Irving Park Road, and the two adiacent ones on Avondale and Keeler (and he said that he will look into the one on Kostner as well). OIPA has been trying to get this addressed for a long time. and through the efforts of many it has been getting cleaned more regularly, but he is absolutely correct that it is still a big problem. With his characteristic energy, Rep. Andrade has already assembled all of the relevant parties: CDOT, IDOT, Streets and Sanitation, the CTA, Union Pacific, and Office of the Mayor. He has them working on potentially new ways to address this issue since netting and sounds are not effective, and cleaning is just a short-term remedial solution. He acknowledges that it will be difficult and probably expensive, but it is now finally a priority. He has even reached out to the Chicago

Cubs to see if they want to help. This is great news!

Representative Andrade then discussed some of legislative efforts, and it turns out that he was being unduly humble when he downplayed his contributions in this sphere. He spoke of a couple of pieces of legislation that he has proposed and passed. The first concerned mortgage foreclosures. Many lenders will not take anything less than full payment of all arrearages once an account is delinquent. They would refuse payments of the current monthly obligation meaning that the property owner got hopelessly behind. His bill created a way for the lender to accept these partial payments. A second law that he has worked on now requires volunteers at a park district (or their parents if they are a minor) to certify that they are not a sex offender before being allowed to volunteer. He also discussed some of the big issues that have arisen in Springfield, such as the budget, pension, and the school funding bill that was passed. Finally, he wanted everyone to know that they can reach him via his cell phone, and even agreed to have it published here. The Andrade Line is (773) 597-5571. It was all very informative and we hope that he will return soon

The meeting then adjourned at about 8:15 p.m.

Next Meeting: November 13, 2017 at 7 p.m. at our normal location, the basement of the Irving Park Baptist Church at 4401 W. Irving Park Road. We are going to call this meeting "Chicago 101" as we are going to have an experienced panel to answer questions about various government services, and what office you should call with various concerns. For example, if you don't know who to contact about a tree that died in your parkway, bring your questions to the next meeting. The meeting after that will be the Holiday Party. It will be on either December 10th or the 11th, and the location has not yet been determined for sure. Please look for notices from us for the time and place. See you there!

Visit to the Past

e at the IPHS thought it might be a good time to draw attention to these two topics, both of which have 'anniversaries' this year.

It was 120 years ago that the Chicago & North Western Railway (now Union Pacific) began to elevate its tracks within the Chicago city limits. The railroad had been at grade level since the origins of Irving Park nearly thirty years earlier, and recent annexation to the city as well as increased population growth contributed to the need for more open and safer thoroughfares. These photos, taken beginning in 1897, show the local track elevation in progress. The following year, the work was completed, and traffic flowed freely westbound on what was then called Irving Park Boulevard.

Honoring Mary Lucile Pepoon

his year marks 100 years since U.S. troops joined their allies in France to finish fighting World War I, the Great War. Accompanying them was a local young woman - one of the first to volunteer her services as a Red Cross nurse. Her name was Mary Lucile Pepoon. She was the daughter of Dr. Herman Silas Pepoon, himself a well-known professor of zoology, botany, and biology at Lake View High School. Lucile lived with her family at 3842 Byron and completed her studies at the German-American Hospital in 1909. She took a position with the city's health department as a school nurse, which she held until the day in May 1917 when the first Chicago Base Hospital Unit No. 12, was mustered into the Army and left for France. The unit was stationed near Boulogne, working with a large British hospital that was

repeatedly bombed by the enemy. Lucile and fellow medical staff tended to more than 35,000 wounded and sick. On March 20th of the following year, Lucile caught trench fever but insisted on working the next two months despite running a fever daily. On June 18, she was taken to the hospital at Etaples in northern France and put under the medical care of the King of England's physician. Five months later, on November 23, Lucille Pepoon died. According to the chaplain who officiated at her funeral, she was buried with full military honors at the Somme American Cemetery at Bony, Dept del'Asine, Picardie, France. Attending her funeral was both American and British generals and officer, a large number of Nursing Sisters, and Sir Bradford (the King's doctor).

Several years after the war, the State Federation of Women's Clubs resolved to plant memorial trees for soldiers who fell during the war. One of the first memorial trees planted was dedicated to a woman —

Miss Lucile Pepoon, R.N. The ceremony took place on May 28, 1921, at Independence Park. The celebration included speeches and a performance by the chorus of the Irving Park School (Lucile's alma mater). The plaque (pictured above) accompanying the memorial tree, placed several hundred feet from her parents' home, read: Lucile Pepoon, R.N. Gave her life to France nursing soldiers of the World War. In her memory, this tree was planted and dedicated by the Field Nurses, Department of Health, Chicago. May 28, 1921.



The banners will remain on the poles through at least December 2019. *OIPA is not responsible for damaged banners* (e.g., due to inclement weather). Replacement banners will be available for \$250 each.

Each street pole will have two banners (measuring 8 feet tall by 30 inches wide) printed on both sides. One side of the pole will have a neighborhood identifier banner and the other side will be one of four taglines, with your chosen sponsorship message. Each sponsor will have an entire pole to market their business/organization. Locations are assigned on a first-come basis.


