



Happy Spring OIP! It's time for some cleaning up of our green spaces! Openlands Tree Grant

We will start spring by celebrating Earth Day a week early with a tree planting in conjunction with Openlands on April 15 (8 a.m. kick-off at 4101 N. Kilbourn). As you heard in last month's newsletter, this planting session will focus on filling gaps in our tree cover on the north side of Irving Park Road. "Adopt A Green Space"

It is also time to revisit our "Adopt A Green Space" Program. OIPA has six "mural planters" and 16 in-ground planting beds on Irving Park Road that must be maintained over the warmer months. For the past few years, we have asked neighborhood residents and businesses to "adopt" one or more of these plots and take care of plant upkeep and trash cleanup. We are asking our community to step up again this year and adopt one of these green spaces. OIPA will provide identification signs for in-ground garden bed plots for those interested. All sponsors will be identified on Facebook and in the newsletter.

"Adopt A Green Space" is a FUN opportunity for a family, group of neighbors, or local business to get out and improve our streetscape. You do not have to be a master gardener to take this on—any maintenance or improvement is appreciated! You'll have a tangible impact on the beautification of our stretch of Irving Park Road and enjoy a sense of pride and ownership whenever you walk, bike or drive past "your" green space.

We've had difficulty finding anyone to adopt the three huge in-ground garden beds on the North side of Irving Park Road,

just west of Kolmar. These are at our community's gateway, but keeping them looking good all season long is challenging. While Board Members Adrienne Chan and Nick Plagman-Frank were out weeding these spaces last season, they were surprised at how much they got done in just a few hours. We have a possible solution—while no one seems to want to be responsible for these beds all season, perhaps a variety of people would be willing to commit an hour or two throughout the summer to make a big difference. This year we will try "Weekly Weeders;" there will be a schedule that runs from May to September, and people can sign up for a week or two to come out at their convenience and pull some weeds.

Ready to tackle some weeds for a good purpose? To sign up as a "Weekly Weeder," sponsor a planter or bed,

OIPA and the Irving Park Garden Club will sponsor a Clean & Green again in May. Stay tuned for the details in our May newsletter.

Financial Report

Lynn Ankney presented the February 2023 Treasurer's Report. February saw modest receipts from standard and premium dues and advertising revenue. The only expenses were for newsletter publication, general meeting refreshments, and annual reporting to the state. The board unanimously approved the Treasurer's Report.

All-Star Party

After taking a two-year hiatus, the much-awaited party for our All-Star members is just around the corner. During the heart of the pandemic, OIPA curated gift bags for our premium members, including items like wine, handmade soap, and wine bottle insulators. The board discussed preparations for the 2023 "Neighborhood All-Star" party, including the budget, theme, decorations, menu, and equipment needed to pull off an event of this size. With the largest number of premium members ever invited, we want to make sure we plan a successful and fun event. Municipal Elections

OIPA was involved in the planning and hosting the Aldermanic Forums in the 30th, 39th, and 45th Wards before the February 28 Municipal Elections. The top two candidates in the 30th and 45th are headed to a runoff on April 4. The board discussed the upcoming candidate meet and greet during our General Meeting on Monday, March 13, and sending information via our weekly email about Chicago's runoff elections, registering to vote, and voting by mail.

Other Business

• Public Safety

After a couple of automobile-related shootings on Irving Park Road, the board discussed ideas about what role OIPA can play in advocating for the safety

of our families and neighbors. Both incidents in the week prior to the board meeting started outside of OIP but ended up escalating to the point of gun violence within our neighborhood boundaries.

The board decided to email a summary of the two incidents that occurred and encourage our neighbors to attend CAPS meetings in their beat. The sergeant in charge of the 17th District CAPS program is **Mike Coughlin**. The CAPS office phone number is (312) 742-4588. Additionally, neighbors are encouraged to call their Alderman's office to request information about crime incidents and to ask for solution-oriented action to combat violent incidents in our neighborhood.

There was also a discussion about pedestrian safety improvements in OIP. A number of traffic incidents have ended up on the pedestrian right-of-way in the past year. OIPA will reach out to elected officials and city agencies to advocate for public safety improvements for pedestrians and bicycles in our neighborhood. This is a momentous task and will require advocacy from neighbors as well.

Murals

The board decided to defer proceeding with soliciting proposals from Greenstar Movement while we develop a budget for mural updates for 2023.

Summarized Minutes of the General Meeting on March 13, 2023

Meeting started at 7:00 p.m.

rom the very start, the March OIPA General
Meeting had a different feel than our typical
meetings at St. John's Episcopal Church. A new
seating layout greeted attendees, and four tables
were parallel to the room's north and south walls.
This new seating arrangement was because OIPA was
hosting our first-ever Aldermanic candidate meet
and greet! The four Aldermanic candidates facing
the runoff election on April 4th were in attendance,
including Jim Gardiner (incumbent) and Megan
Mathias seeking election in the 45th Ward, and Ruth
Cruz and Jessica Gutierrez seeking election in the
30th Ward. Also attending was Congressman Mike
Quigley, representative of Illinois's 5th congressional
district, which includes the entirety of Old Irving Park.

OIPA Board Vice President Scott Legan started the meeting promptly by welcoming those in attendance and introducing the OIPA Board of Directors. He then invited Congressman Mike Quigley to the mic.

Congressman Quigley greeted the audience and applauded us for taking part in the democratic process just by being present at a candidate meet and greet. He recognized the aldermanic candidates and thanked them for their willingness to serve by seeking public office. He praised all of the work Aldermen do on the street level, a lot of which goes unnoticed.

The Congressman started by sharing his updated district boundaries and the location of his new congressional office (3223 N Sheffield Ave). He reminded neighbors about some of the services his office provides like passport, Medicare and Medicaid services, and help with Social Security benefits. He prefaced that while the congressional staff is happy to help with expedited passport services, travelers are encouraged to double-check their passports before the start of their trip.

Next, Congressman Quigley addressed the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank and shared that the federal government would make the depositor's accounts whole. He reminded us that he supported Dodd Frank, the Wall Street Reform, and Consumer Protection Act. Among the provisions of this act are mandates that banks of this size keep a larger safety net to prevent collapse.

The Congressman shared that one of the concerns his office has heard from constituents is freight

trains in our neighborhoods following the Norfolk Southern train derailment in Ohio, which caused serious environmental and health concerns for nearby residents. Chicago has a lot of intermodal transportation, including many train lines crossing through our city and backyards. He reminded us that considering this tragedy, freight rail is still safer than pipelines and tanker trucks and that technology like Positive Train Control (PTC) is a big step towards

preventing disasters like this in the future. PTC is currently required and used on all Class 1 train lines like those running through OIP.

As a senior member of the House Appropriations Committee and the Ranking member of the Subcommittee on Transportation, Housing, and Urban Development, Congressman Quigley shared some highlights of the bipartisan Infrastructure bill that passed last year in congress and was signed by the President. This bill includes \$18 billion in additional infrastructure funds for Chicago.

Some of the things this \$18 billion has been earmarked for in our city include:

- Making all CTA train stations ADA compliant
- Investments in pedestrian and bicycle safety improvements are required alongside new transportation improvements
- Grant money for an elevator at the Irving Park YMCA

- Expansion to the 606 pedestrian and biking trail
- Money for improvements at:
 - Lincoln Park Conservatory
 - The Field Museum
 - The Shedd Aquarium
 - The Museum of Science and Industry

The Congressman thanked the Aldermanic candidates and the meeting attendees for participating in the democratic process and invited one question.

Q: Old Irving Park is sliced up by railroads and expressways. What can we do to improve our neighborhood connections, and how can the Congressman help?

A: Five different entities control stakes in many of the shared infrastructures in OIP. He encouraged the community to work together for the improvements

we would like to see in our neighborhood. By uniting as OIPA to involve city and state stakeholders and the Congressman's office, we have a good chance to make change happen.

OIPA Vice President Scott Legan thanked Congressman Quigley and gave some quick ground rules to the Aldermanic candidates before inviting them up to share a 2–2.5 minute statement and inviting meeting attendees to make the rounds of the candidate meet and greet.

Following Scott's instructions, each candidate took a few minutes to share remarks about themselves and their campaign. Neighbors were then encouraged to partake of the snacks and wine provided by Clarendale Six Corners and to talk with the 30th and 45th Ward candidates.

The formal program concluded at 7:27 p.m.



MEDICAID RENEWAL UPDATE



Got Medicaid? Get Ready To Renew!

Information submitted by Annie Swingen, OIPA Board Director, via Congressman Mike Ouigley's office and Medicaid resources.

n response to the COVID Public Health Emergency from 2020-present, the U.S. government waived the review of the eligibility process for Medicaid subscribers and instead provided continuous coverage as we navigated the pandemic. However, as of April 1, 2023, states are returning to an annual assessment of subscriber eligibility for registration and renewal of Medicaid policies.

What to Expect?

Get ready to renew your Medicaid! To avoid unnecessary delays in paperwork transmission and submission, please update your address with Illinois Medicaid today!

You can go online to update your address at **medicaid**. **illinois.gov** and follow the below instructions:

- Click 'Manage My Case' at abe.illinois.gov to set up your online account
- 2) **Verify your address is correct** (the address Medicaid has on file for you is in the 'Contact Us' tab)
- 3) **Look up your due date** so you know when to expect your redetermination letter (should arrive 30 days prior)

Or call 877-805-5312 for free from 7:45 a.m.- 4:30 p.m. (TTY, call 1-877-204-1012) to speak to a Medicaid Illinois specialist.

Medicaid will start sending renewal notices in the mail at the start of May 2023, with notices arriving one month before their respective due date (the first of the following month.) PLEASE NOTE THAT EVERYONE'S RENEWAL DATE IS DIFFERENT.

If Medicaid has enough information about a customer to automatically renew them, their renewal form will tell them what information they used to determine their eligibility and ask for any corrections. If Medicaid needs

more information, the form will ask for more information.

What Happens If You Miss Your Due Date?

It is highly recommend you submit your renewal, even if you are late. After you miss your renewal date, a letter will be sent to you telling you the date you will lose your Medicaid coverage. However, there is a chance that we can still renew you if you submit your renewal within 90 days of that date. Cases are reviewed on an individual basis

If you are reinstated, your Medicaid coverage will be retroactive back to your original renewal due date.

If you are more than 90 days late, you are required to reapply completely with a new application.

What if You are No Longer Eligible for Medicaid?

If someone fails to submit their renewal or no longer qualifies for Illinois Medicare, they may lose coverage a month after their renewal due date. If you are no longer eligible for Medicaid, quickly getting other health insurance is important. You usually are allowed a special enrollment period of 60 days to enroll in a new plan. If you are employed and are offered health benefits, ask your job's human resources representative about health insurance or visit the official Affordable Care Act marketplace for Illinois at GetCoveredIllinois.gov.

You can find detailed information online regarding Illinois Medicaid and the End of Continuous Coverage on the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) website at www2.illinois.gov/hfs/MedicalClients/Pages/FAQSEndofContinuousCoverage.aspx.

SPINACH FATAYER

Fatayer are a staple of Lebanese cuisine. The variety of fillings are endless! The most popular ones you will find daily at local bakeries in Lebanon are sabenekh (Spinach) and lahme (Meat).



- Pre-made biscuit dough in the tube (such as Pillsbury Grands Biscuits).
- ·1 egg (for brushing dough)

Spinach Filling

- 2-10 oz. Spinach Bags or Frozen
- •1 medium Onion
- 1 small Tomato (Optional)
- · 2 tb. Olive Oil
- ·1 Lemon (Juiced)
- · 2 tb. Sumac
- 1 tsp. Salt
- 1/2 tsp. Black Pepper
- 1/2 tsp. 7 Spices

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 400F and place oven rack in the middle. Prepare baking sheets with parchment paper or spray with cooking spray.
- Prepare the spinach filling. If using fresh spinach, roughly chop and put in a large bowl. Sprinkle with a teaspoon of salt. Set aside for 10 minutes, then squeeze the spinach dry. If using frozen spinach, thaw out then squeeze out as much water as you can. Set aside.
- Chop the onion and tomato (optional) finely. Add to the spinach along with the olive oil, black pepper, 7 spices and sumac.
- Juice a lemon and add it to the filling right before stuffing so filling does not get too wet. Taste for seasoning.
- Roll out each biscuit dough to a 5-inch circle (about the size of a pita). Place about 2 tablespoons of filling in the middle. Bring two sides together and pinch to close. Bring the third side up so it looks like a triangle and pinch to close well. Place on baking sheet.
- Whisk one egg well. Using a pastry brush, brush all the fatayer on the sheet right before putting in the oven.
- Bake for 12 minutes until golden brown.

Metropolitan Water Reclamation District Rain Barrel Program!

ain barrels are a type of green infrastructure that captures rainwater from your roof and saves it when needed. Rain barrels can also help prevent sewer overflows and flooding by keeping this water out of the sewer system. You can use rain barrel water to wash your car. water you lawn or clean work boots and tools. Rain barrel water is naturally free of chlorine, lime, and calcium; some gardeners swear their plants prefer it. However, since rain barrel water is runoff from your roof, please do not drink it!

Since the rain barrel in this program are repurposed, they may have scuffs, scratches, and signs of previous use. Initially, the barrels were used to transport and store olives or vegetables. Before home delivery, each rain barrel goes through an industrial wash system, where high-pressure water

is used to clean them. No cleaners or detergents are used that could alter their food grade status. Any contents that may be left over, including the wash water, are all food grade, biodegradable, and considered a nutrient for the soil.

Discounted rain barrels will be available to Cook County residents beginning April 1, 2023, by ordering at https://mwrd.org/rain-barrels.

Free shipping is included in the price (\$43) for barrels and any accessories ordered with them. Each rain barrel consists of a two ft. flexible downspout pipe. Delivery may take up to 30 days.

These donations and so many others from members of Old Irving Park are greatly appreciated and help us meet our mission of being "Neighbors Helping Neighbors!"


