

Summarized Minutes of the Board of Directors Meeting on March 27, 2023

Meeting scheduled for 7:30 pm via Zoom Meeting Started 7:35 pm

Attendees: David Ryan, Scott Legan, Merry Marwig, Meredith O'Sullivan, Colleen Kenny, Anne Swingen, Adrienne Chan, Lynn Ankney, Michael Cannon, and Nicholas Plagman-Frank

Financial Report

Since the April Board of Directors meeting was held early due to Spring Break, the March Treasurer's Report will be presented alongside the April financial report during the Board of Directors' meeting on May 1.

Membership

Because we distribute OIPA branded canvas tote bags to members subscribed at the "Good Neighbor" and "All Star" levels of membership in May, some discussion was had about this year's tote bags color, style, and print. This spurred conversation about potentially replacing the signature tote bag with something different in future years. A couple ideas that were shared included a nice water bottle, or a custom print from an OIP artist.

We also talked briefly about OIPA membership and advertising rates. Because of increasing costs for newsletter printing and publication, membership giveaways, and OIPA events, it may be time to consider rate increases. Advertising and membership rates have not increased in more than five years. This discussion was tabled for a future meeting.

All-Star Party

Invitations have been sent for the Cinco de Mayo themed OIPA All-Star Party scheduled on May 5, 2023. An early check of confirmed RSVPs was shared by our gracious host **Colleen Kenny** and a couple of names were added to the list of those invited

Newsletter Planning

Dave Ryan volunteered to write May's message from the board which will include a call-out for submissions of graduate information in celebration of our neighborhood graduates for publication in the June newsletter. We will also plug for the upcoming OIPA ice cream social in June.

Other Business

- · 39th Ward Participatory Budgeting
 - Project ideas are due by April 16 and prioritize:
 - · Parks & Recreation
 - · Safety & Environment
 - · Community & Culture

A couple ideas shared by board members during the meeting were:

- Viaduct improvements such as new murals, sidewalks, and lighting.
- Pedestrian safety improvements such as pedestrian piers and curb bump outs along Montrose Avenue.

The board decided to send an eBlast calling for 39th ward residents to share their ideas with

hello@oldirvingpark.com by April 10 so that we can submit ideas as a neighborhood united, to the 39th ward office before the deadline.

Metropolitan Planning Commission (MPC)

Lynn Ankney and **Adrienne Chan** attended a Reconnecting Communities virtual meeting/presentation on 3/27 at 2 pm.

Out of 120 plus projects evaluated city-wide, 22 were identified as "top-rated," including two within Old Irving Park and Portage Park neighborhood boundaries:

- A project that proposes pedestrian and bicycle safety improvements to the areas around the Kennedy Expressway at West Irving Park Road and North Keeler Avenue.
- A rails-to-trails project converting an underutilized rail line on the eastern boundary of Portage Park into a bicycle and pedestrian trail that connects the 606 Trail to the south with the planned Webster Spur trail to the north.

MPC shared potential funding sources, starting with planning grants and access to pro bono design services. Federal funding is potentially available for these projects.

MPC is able to provide guidance and support when applying for grants, but the community needs to advocate for itself to make these projects happen.

The board will continue to investigate the next logical steps to continue the forward momentum of these opportunities and leverage relationships with groups that have completed projects like these in the past.

Pedestrian Safety Initiatives

Lynn spoke with a representative from 47th Ward (Alderman Martin's) office and provided an update to the hoard

Next steps identified from the dialogue and discussed by the board:

- Gather data from the city's data portal to justify the need for improvements. This is publicly available information
- Review and reference the recently updated rules that give the City authority to make improvements on state roads.
- Research funding, CDOT, TIFF, and State of Illinois.

Murals

Cyd Smillie from Arts Alive Chicago provided a detailed inventory of conditions and a budget for refreshing and replacing murals within the neighborhood this year. The board decided that a subset of directors would review the proposal in detail and make recommendations to the full board in May.

The board will also reach out to a couple of OIP residents with knowledge and experience with mosaics while we explore this as an mural replacement option.

• Irving Park Road Streetscaping Elements

Dave Ryan completed a cleanup of most of the garden beds along the north and south side of Irving Park Road in late March and took an inventory of trash cans, garden bed fences, and planters that could use a little TLC. This sparked a conversation about who is responsible for the maintenance of these items. While OIPA members and volunteers

maintain the plantings, there are questions about who is responsible for the hard elements of this infrastructure. The board discussed and decided to begin rolling some of the above-ground planters into mural maintenance. Hard element maintenance will be revisited once the growing season starts.

What is Participatory Budgeting?

Chicago residents in participating aldermanic wards have a vote on how to spend the \$1.5 million in "menu money" that City Council allocates to each Ward for infrastructure maintenance, projects, and improvements. Through participatory budgeting, community members get a voice. Citizens can propose neighborhood infrastructure projects in their Wards, such as road or park improvements. Those projects then go up for a vote in the community. Check your respective Ward office for process deadlines and voting.

At the time of publishing this newsletter, the 39th Ward Idea Project Collection deadline has passed (March 15 to April 16). Check the 39th Ward website for updates (https://aldermannugent.com/ participatory-budgeting) or their enewsletter.

The 39th Ward Participatory Budgeting 2021 PB Cycle and Winning Projects

During the 2021 PB cycle, the 39th Ward hosted idea collection events. Community representatives worked with ward staff and city agencies to develop 16 ballot items, that included sidewalk repairs and other infrastructure improvements. Voting took place January 31, 2022 to February 11, 2022. 1,041 residents voted at the ward office, in the community, and online.

- Improve Forest Glen Avenue Sidewalk to Multi-Use Path (\$100,000)
- Bryn Mawr Avenue Beautification (\$50,000)

Summarized Minutes of the General Meeting on April 10, 2023

Meeting started at 7:30 p.m.

After a scramble to set up our first presenter's audio-visual presentation, the April OIPA General Meeting was underway. Adrienne Chan, OIPA President, welcomed attendees and introduced the Board Members in the room. After doing a remarkable job of stalling for just a couple of additional minutes, Adrienne welcomed Jac Charlier (pictured below) of the North Park Village (NPV) Advisory Council to present an updated plan for North Park Village.



Jac, an energetic volunteer and cochair of the NPV Advisory Council, is no stranger to OIPA. Having served on the OIPA board and as an involved member of the community, he came prepared with a call to action for those in attendance.

North Park Village, located east of Pulaski and north of Bryn Mawr, sits on more than a 100-acre property comprising seven zones or management areas, including:

- Nature Preserve (46 acres) trails, woodlands, savanna, prairie, wetlands
- Peterson Park (23 acres) playground, soccer and baseball fields, tennis courts, fieldhouse
- · Rock Garden (3.4 acres)
- · Nature Study Area (12 acres) Walking Stick Woods

- · Community Gardens (3.2 acres)
- General Open Space (12.4 acres)
- · Cultural Public Space (10.3 acres)

This property is the city's largest natural area on the north side. It is part of an easement that limits the land's use to protect its conservation value and preserve the natural and scenic open space for future generations.


After sharing what NPV is today and its history, starting as Chicago's Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium in 1915, Jac asked OIPA members to get involved. After more than 40 years, the NPV Advisory Council is undertaking a process to create an updated North Park Village plan. The plan will address topics such as:

- Transportation, walking & biking
- · Open space, gardens, & sustainability
- Public safety
- · Historic preservation
- · Adaptive re-use of existing vacant and underutilized facilities
- Parks Updated Vision Plans for Peterson Park and North Park Village Nature Center Park

Jac invited and challenged OIPA to share our input by taking the NPV Building for the Future Survey on the North River Commission's Building for the Future website. The video presentation shown by Jac can also be viewed on the website. It includes, in chronological order, the past, present, and building for the future of North Park Village.

After the survey closes, a community meeting will be held on Saturday, June 10, to present the survey

results and kick off the process of selecting a steering committee for the plan.

Jac opened the final minutes of his presentation to questions.

- **Q**: Are there any ideas for the NPV plan the Advisory Council is championing?
- **A:** The Advisory Council is relying on community input to drive the planning process.
- **Q:** Does the Nature Center still hold children's nature classes?
- **A:** Yes, the Nature Center is a member of the Advisory Council and is a strong member of the community.
- **Q:** There was a water feature, including a waterfall, planned in NPV. Was it built?
- **A:** Yes, the water feature was built and is beautiful; however, it is currently closed for the season.
- **Q:** How many privately owned condos were built on the NPV property?
- **A:** Unknown, but there are both privately owned condos and senior apartments located within North Park Village.

Adrienne thanked Jac for his presentation and welcomed the next presenter of the night, **Debbie**Maher Co-President of the Irving Park Garden Club.

The Irving Park Garden Club is a group of people who like to garden and meet monthly to celebrate our local gardening community and listen to various speakers present on topics such as the best plants for shade gardens and window displays designed with flowers. These two topics happen to be on top of the 2023 Garden Club schedule.

Debbie shared the IPGC's 2023 full schedule of events available (see page 22) and made the call for Garden Club membership. Dues are only \$25 per year, which fund speakers and refreshments at monthly meetings. Additionally, the Garden Club plants and maintains the gray

raised planters lining Irving Park Road within OIP's houndaries

Debbie also called for volunteers to participate in the IPGC's Annual Garden Walk on Saturday, June 24. This year's walk will take place north of Irving Park Road. No experience is required to participate in the Garden Walk; it is a great way to meet neighbors and participate in the community. Volunteers are also needed to help maintain Trip Gardens, managed by the Garden Club, and for a neighborhood Clean and Green event OIPA and IPGC are partnering on in April, focusing on ground planter beds and viaduct areas in the neighborhood.

For the last part of the Garden Club presentation, Adrienne joined Debbie in presenting OIPA's annual donation to the Garden Club. OIPA's \$550 donation helps fund the planting of the gray raised planters, previously mentioned. These raised beds and the inground beds on Irving Park Road add so much color and beauty to our neighborhood throughout the growing season. There are still in-ground beds that are in need of adoption in 2023. Please consider volunteering to help maintain these gardens this spring and summer. In the gardening and spring cleaning theme, Adrienne also announced a new "Weekly Weeders" program that OIPA is starting this spring. This program will focus on the two large garden beds west of Kolmar on the north side of Irving Park Road. Because of the size of these garden beds, they have not been adopted in past years like the others along Irving Park Road. The plan is to have neighbors volunteer 1 or 2 hours at a time to pull weeds and clean up these gardens. If different people or groups of people spend a little time each week, it will make a big difference in the appearance of these two beds.

In the final few minutes of the meeting Adrienne, Alderman Gardner, and other community members shared some announcements.



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


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INVITATION TO OIPA NEIGHBORS



he enjoyment—in particular, the emotional experience—of certain kinds of music can often be enhanced by a deeper understanding of the construction of the piece—call it the notational grammar. By analogy, many of us might have a weak comprehension of a foreign language, but with a facing translation can appreciate much better the nuance and intent of what the writer is trying to say. In the same vein, it occurred to me that it might be interesting to see if some members of this organization [OIPA] would like to meet, perhaps once a month, to share their understanding of a piece of music, as well as their emotional response.

While I accept that 'any' music you like is good music, I am thinking of a fairly restricted range of that medium we all enjoy. Specifically, I am narrowing down the work of what now passes for 'classical' music, e.g., Bach, Beethoven, Schubert, and beyond. There is more going on in the first movement of Beethoven's Third Symphony than is apparent in casual listening. And there is more going on in Bach's Art of the Fugue than


almost any of us will ever appreciate.

his time of year, I would typically plan big holiday meals and daydream about the desserts I'd make to bring to parties. Ok, (gulp), this year is going to be different (sigh), but I am still going to celebrate with my kids and the very few others in my "pod" with some fun cooking parties.

I am planning a Potsticker Party! Everyone will get dressed up (I can't wait to wear heels!), and we'll turn on some fancy music (I can't wait to dance!) and dim the lights and maybe open some sparkling wine (and bubbly apple juice for the kids).

I'll set up a beautiful spread of minced veggies, herbs, sauces, and wrappers and welcome everyone to make potstickers while I cook them and sing along to the music at the top of my lungs. There will be ornate paper invitations slipped under bedroom doors very soon, and I will have as much fun planning a party for five as I would for fifty. I invite YOU to try your hand at this wonderful recipe. Whether you are in the mood to party or just make a nice meal is a lot of fun. Kids especially love making these. The first few might be messy, but you'll get the hang of it with a little practice. You can freeze them, too. So, get out your dancing shoes and plan for a bit of fun in the kitchen.

POTSTICKERS (Yields 50)

Prep time one hour if one person is making them


INGREDIENTS

- · ½ pound ground pork*
- 1/4 cup finely grated carrots 1 cup finely sliced cabbage
- ¼ cup tablespoon finely chopped green onions 1 garlic clove, minced
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoon ginger, grated
- 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar or rice vinegar 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon sesame oil (optional) Vegetable oil for pan
- · Prepackaged frozen round dumpling wrappers

*To make these vegetarian you can use 1 cup diced mushrooms or firm tofu to replace the pork.

DIRECTIONS

- Remove dumpling wrappers from the freezer and let them defrost.
- Add all ingredients except for vegetable oil and dumpling wrappers into a bowl and mix together with your hands.
- With one wrapper in hand, wet the edges of the wrapper with your finger, add about a tablespoon of the pork mixture to the middle of the wrapper.



RECIPES FROM THE BOARD & MEMBERS

- Holding the filled wrapper cradled between your thumb and middle finger, use your index finger to flatten the pork mixture.
- Using your thumb and index finger press the wrapper to close the dumpling.
- When all dumplings have been made, heat a large pan with about 3 tablespoons of vegetable oil until it shimmers.
- Add dumplings to the hot oil. Don't move the dumplings.
- Once dumplings are brown and crispy on the bottom, add about a half cup of water to the pan and cover with a lid to steam them for about 5 minutes or until the dumpling wrappers are slightly see-through. Remove from the pan and serve with soy sauce for dipping or a ginger dipping sauce.

KIDS CAN:

- · Grate carrots and ginger and thinly slice cabbage
- · Finely cut green onions with kitchen scissors
- · Mince garlic with a garlic press
- Measure seasonings and veggies into the mixing bowl
- Make their own potstickers!

PARENTS CAN:

- Help mix everything
- Help with potsticker making
- Fry and steam potstickers

FREEZING INSTRUCTIONS

 Place individual uncooked potstickers on a parchment lined sheet pan or tray that fits in your freezer. Once frozen (should take about two hours?) pop them off into a labeled ziplock bag. No need to defrost them before cooking, simply use the cooking instructions above.

GINGER SOY DIPPING SAUCE

Yields one cup sauce. Prep time five minutes.

This dipping sauce is so versatile. It can be a dipping sauce for potstickers, a marinade for meats or even a tasty vinaigrette for a green salad with cucumbers, peppers and cold noodles. What's more is it all comes together in a jar and can be kept in the fridge for up to two weeks

INGREDIENTS

- · 1/2 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup rice wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons finely grated ginger 2 tablespoons chopped green onion 2 medium cloves garlic, minced
- · 2 teaspoons sugar
- · 1 teaspoon sesame oil

DIRECTIONS

 Measure all ingredients into a jar with a tight fitting lid and shake until well combined.

KIDS CAN:

- · Measure ingredients.
- · Shake it up!

Busy as a Bee

ay is the "semi-official" start of the gardening season in Chicago, as the chance of frost killing our newly purchased annuals is small (we hope). May is also a very busy month for the Irving Park Garden Club with lots of events on the calendar.

- First up is a trip to Sunrise Greenhouse on May 6 when members will car pool to Grant Park, Illinois, to shop a wonderful selection of veggies, flowers, trees, shrubs, and plants spread over acres and acres of space. Great prices make the trip worthwhile.
- Then on Saturday, May 20, we will fulfill our partnership with OIPA and Farmers Market Garden Center, our wonderful local nursery, to fill the square containers along Irving Park Rd. and brighten our main drag. Volunteers have agreed to adopt the containers, fill them with the flowers chosen by FMGC, and then keep the plants watered through the long, hot summer.
- Also on May 20, the membership will gather at 11 a.m. at St. John's Episcopal Church, 3857 N. Kostner Ave., to attend our annual plant exchange. Our gardeners have been dividing their perennials to revitalize, spread, and share them, and they'll also bring any extra seedlings that they've started indoors.



Want to create a habitat for early season pollinators? Here are some simple steps you can take. Plant more flowers that are native to the Midwest. Eliminate pesticide use. Be a "messy" gardener, as beneficial insects are hibernating in the hollow stems and dead wood you're itching to clean up.

You also can delay mowing your lawn during the month of May to provide food for bees early in the growing season. No Mow May is a conservation initiative that's catching on across the country.

Don't think you can be that messy? Then try a mullet — mow the front yard and let the back yard get shaggy. Here's a little sign the kids can color and you can put in your window to let your neighbors know you're just trying to do some good in the world.




