

MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD



New & Improved—Time for a Refresh & Update

IPA has come a long way from managing our membership using a card catalog and accepting payments only via cash and checks! Over the summer of 2016, we refreshed this publication, relaunched our website (www.oldirvingpark.com), and began offering online payments for membership and advertising. We're using the summer meeting hiatus to improve our membership database management this year. A vibrant, growing civic association such as ours demands efficient and accurate technology for its members and volunteer board members.

What does this mean for you, our members?

You won't see any changes to our website, but we want to do away with the "everyone's membership ends on 8/31 unless you join after May 1 or you have an auto-renewal payment." Too messy and confusing!

Moving forward, the date you join is your membership anniversary. We intend to use easy monthly reporting from our membership database to identify members whose membership is about to expire. We can then send members an automated but customizable, gentle nudge via the email they provide upon joining.

What does this mean for us volunteers?

While Meredith is a whiz at creating pivot tables in Excel, the current process is time-consuming and arduous. With over 600 member households (and growing), we need a set of tools that make joining (and renewing membership of) the organization easy and volunteering manageable, so we researched database options and found one that will work for us. We on the board are volunteers, and having processes and technology that allow for easy handoffs to new board members is key to bringing in new energy and recruiting new members to our volunteer team.

We plan to launch our new database in August, but we'll provide an update on our progress in the August edition of this newsletter (which is the next issue as we take July off).

Community Infrastructure Walk—David Ryan, Board Member

State Representative Lindsey LaPointe, 10th
District State Senator Robert Martwick, and 30th
Ward Alderperson-Elect Ruth Cruz on Sunday morning,
May 7, 2023, for a walk through the areas under and
around the Kennedy Expressway and adjacent railroad
bridges at Pulaski, Irving Park, and Keeler commonly
referred to as the Irving Park transit hub.

The goal of the walk was to identify areas of concern and solicit input from neighborhood residents. By all measures, the walk was a success. All three elected officials spoke to the group before the walk and expressed their commitment to improving the area. Senator Martwick stated that unlike in the recent past, there are now State of Illinois funds available for just such projects. He further noted that Federal funds were likely also available.

Representative LaPointe stressed that while no immediate projects existed, the walk was designed as an important first step to creating a list of possible projects and a plan of action.

Alderperson-elect Cruz echoed Ms. LaPointe, stating that it was up to the community to provide a list of priorities.

A question about the actual ward boundaries and responsible elected officials was answered by Old Irving Park Association Board member **Lynn Ackney** who stated that the key to success was the cooperation of all community members, groups, and officials regardless of boundaries.

The matter of pigeon infestation and the accompanying health hazards of their droppings, as well as keeping up with the general littering problem, was voiced by many in the group.

Also present for the walk were Senator Martwick's Chief of Staff, **Christopher Lempa**, and Outreach Director, **David Medrano**.

Participants provided their contact information and look forward to the representatives providing the next steps in this long-term effort to bring permanent improvements and change.

Summarized Minutes of the Board of Directors Meeting on May 1, 2023

Financial Report

Lynn Ankney presented the Treasurer's Reports for March and April. The two-month review was due to the April Board of Directors meeting held on March 27, prior to closing the monthly books. Highlights from the reports included:

- Expenses outweighed receipts in both March and April. This is expected this time of year when there are not much membership dues trickling in.
- Checks were written and cashed for two charitable donations in April. One to the Irving Park Garden Club, which maintains the gray, square raised planters along Irving Park Road, and the other to Keep OIP Clean, the cleanup effort run by Dan William that raises money for professional cleaning of the viaducts, on/off ramps, and other public spaces in our neighborhood.

The Board unanimously approved the March and April Treasurer's reports.

Membership

The membership discussion led by Meredith O'Sullivan focused on the plan to upgrade our toolkit by investing in a database management platform. The upgrade will bring efficiency and automation to the monumental task of managing our membership database, which is currently managed manually. Meredith and Lynn have put a great deal of time and effort into researching and selecting the right database platform for our needs. The new tools will fully integrate with our payment processing platform and website. The Board expects to finish the migration to the new platform this summer.

Prior to fall membership renewals, the Board also expects to finalize and announce the updated advertising and membership rates. Rate increases will cover the rising cost of newsletter publication and printing and the perks we provide at our premium membership levels, like the upcoming All-Star party on May 5. Please watch your email and upcoming newsletters for more information.

A brief discussion was also about doing away with the set membership enrollment period beginning September 1.

Attendance counts are in, and we expect beautiful weather for the Cinco de Mayo party! Colleen, our planner and gracious host, provided the Board with the final preparation updates and details. If you are not already an OIPA member at the Neighborhood All-Star level, you may want to consider upgrading

- The neighborhood Clean & Green, in partnership with the Irving Park Garden Club on Saturday, April 29, was a success! The Board discussed scheduling another Clean & Green in mid to late summer. Additional ideas shared were:
 - Involve Cleanup Club Chicago in the next cleanup.
 - Coordinate with Dan and Keep OIP Clean's efforts at the viaducts.
 - Encouraging neighbors to pitch in daily by publishing an article in the newsletter highlighting a couple of neighbors undertaking neighborhood cleanup efforts of their own.
 - Reach out to elected officials and find additional viaduct cleanup solutions.
- Contact the 45th Ward office about the Thirteen Pins building request cleanup.
 - This has been requested. The ward office will reach out to the property owner.
- Get updates about vacant lot development north of Klee Building on Milwaukee Ave.
 - · No new information currently.

- Push Northwestern Medical about plans for residential property south of their development on Kenneth.
 - The Board will reach out to Northwestern.
- Irving Park Historical Society archives
 Schurz High School has requested an on-site visit to review the storage location/future of Irving
 Park Historical Society archives.
 - Michael Cannon visited Schurz to look at the contents of the collection. There is quite a bit of stuff in boxes and bins—some of historical value
 - The Board discussed what to do next, where to relocate items of significance, and how to begin the huge task of cataloging and digitizing the archives.
 - The Board decided to move the Archives from Schurz to a board member's home so we can go through them during the June BOD meeting.
 - The Board will reach out to the Independence Library and ask if they are interested in housing the archives long-term.



OIPA GENERAL MEETING REPORT



Summarized Minutes of the General Meeting on May 8, 2023

Meeting started at 7:05 p.m.

With a full roster of speakers on the agenda, OIPA President **Adrienne Chan** quickly called the meeting to order. For the last general meeting of the season, OIPA invited our recently elected Alderman from the 30th, 39th, and 45th wards to speak to the neighbors and members in attendance. Adrienne took a minute to introduce the Board Members present at the meeting but very efficiently transitioned into the first speaker of the night, **Samantha Nugent**, **39th Ward Alderwoman**.

Alderman Nugent thanked OIPA for the invitation and greeted everyone present. She also introduced her new Deputy Chief of Staff, Sam Brewer, who was also in attendance.

The Alderman quickly transitioned into announcements of upcoming events in the 39th Ward, including:


- The 3rd year of Participatory Budgeting in 39th Ward. The Participatory Budgeting Committee is reviewing proposals submitted this spring and will be narrowed down to the final projects that will be on the community ballot. Voting will begin at the end of June and is open to 39th Ward Residents aged 14 years and older.
- A shredding event will be held at St. Edwards on June 11. Electronics and prescription drugs will also be accepted at this event.
- Changes to the city's tree trimming services which will now be completed on a grid system, Alderman Nugent encouraged residents to call the 39th ward office if emergency tree service is needed.
- Street sweeping has started for 2023. Keep an eye out for no posted no parking signs on alternating sides of your block.

With her final few minutes, Alderman Nugent invited auestions from OIPA members.

- **Q:** Do you have any information on the development of the traffic study conducted on Montrose west of the Kennedy Expressway?
- **A:** We don't know the status of the traffic study and thus cannot share any updates. I ask my office to follow up with you directly.

With no further questions, the Alderman thanked OIPA and neighbors again and yielded the floor to our next speaker of the night, **Alderwoman Elect Ruth Cruz**.

Adrienne introduced the newly elected **Alderwoman Elect Ruth Cruz** (pictured above) from the 30th Ward.

Alderwoman Elect Ruth Cruz thanked Adrienne, greeted neighbors, and introduced her staff. Joining the Alderwoman Elect were her Director of Policy and Community Zoning, Jerome, and Community Outreach Liaison Katy. Alderwoman Cruz will be sworn in as a freshman on the Chicago City Council on Monday, May 15.

The Alderwoman Elect shared that she was excited to be here. With limited time and many things to share with OIPA members, she launched straight into Ward events and highlights from the Infrastructure Walk she organized on Sunday, May 7.

Announcements & Updates:

- There is a 30th Ward shredding event scheduled for Saturday, May 20
- The May 7 Infrastructure Walk quickly brought to light the need for additional cleaning under Ward viaducts in the 30th (i.e., Blue Line @ Irving Park,

Pulaski, Metra at Irving Park Road, and Keeler under the Kennedy).

- Alderwoman Elect Cruz has reached out to State Rep Jamie Andrade to learn more about the process of cleaning up after the pigeons and how to protect staff and volunteers involved in the effort.
- The Alderwoman's staff have been tasked with looking into creative ways to address the bird problem.
- The 30th Ward office has committed to cleaning the Blue Line viaducts (IPR and Pulaski) quarterly with her team (4 times a year)
- Alderwoman Elect Cruz challenged the Alders in 45 (Gardiner) and 39 (Nugent) to join her office in the cleanup effort to increase the frequency of scheduled cleanings and broaden the areas receiving regular cleanings in Old Irving Park.
- The temporary 30th Ward Office is located at 5714 W. Belmont.
- There is no phone number at this time, but please use the email address cruz30ward@gmail.com to contact the Alderwoman Elect.

After finishing the announcements, Alderwoman Elect Cruz invited questions from attendees.

- **Q:** Has your office started outgoing email communications with residents?
- **A:** Outbound email communication will begin the week of May 15.
- **Q:** Will you be cleaning the opposite side of the Pulaski viaduct (the west side of the viaduct is in Ward 45)?
- **A:** I will work to get buy-in from the other Alderman (Gardiner) to clean the entire area.



- **Q:** Do you have any plans to address the pigeons, like additional abatement, etc?
- **A:** No plan currently, but I will work this into the longterm plan.
- **Q**: Why don't you get swath workers (inmates) from the sheriff's office to help with cleanups?
- A: Plans like this take time but will be considered.
- **Q**: Will you address the unhoused people living under the viaducts?
- **A:** We will work with aid agencies to provide services for the people if they want help.
- **Q:** I could not attend the infrastructure walk. Will the Metra viaducts be included in the plans for cleaning?
- **A:** My office will need to work with State Representative LaPointe and Senator Martwick for additional support on railroad property.
- **Q**: Will the Kostner viaduct be addressed in your cleanup efforts?

- **A:** We don't have plans in the areas outside of the 30th Ward. We will need help from 45 and 39 to collectively work on the cleanup effort.
- Q: What are the 30th Ward boundaries?
- **A:** A Ward map is probably the best resource to view boundaries.
- Q: Where can we access the ward map?
- **A:** If you share your email, I can send you a link to the Chicago Board of Elections website map.
- **Q:** Have any changes been made to the Ward maps since May 2022? There is conflicting information online.
- **A:** The Chicago Board of Elections website has the most updated map.
- **Q**: Are there any updates on the Milwaukee Ave Grayland Station construction?
- A: I don't have any updates at this time but I will find more information and communicate this with OIPA. We will contact the departments holding the permit to get updates.

With no further questions, Alderwoman Elect Cruz thanked members and encouraged them to "please reach out and feel free to contact us!"

Adrienne again took the floor to introduce our last guest of the night, **45th Ward Alderman Jim Gardiner**.

Jim Gardiner greeted neighbors and shared the main purpose of his attendance: to review the updated Streets and Sanitation, Bureau of Forestry's updated tree-trimming process with constituents. He shared that tree trimming is the most requested service the 45th Ward office receives. Because of changes to the tree trimming process, constituents can no longer reach out to 311 or contact the ward office for non-emergency tree trimming requests. Trimming is now conducted on a grid system with all trees within the scheduled grid receiving service within that specific grid's trimming schedule. The Alderman shared that he requested that the Department of Forestry start in Old Irving Park first.

Alderman Gardiner shared a few announcements before introducing **Greg Wagner** from the Chicago Streets and Sanitations Department of Forestry.

- The Gardiner Angels (the 45 Ward's volunteer program) participates in cleanup throughout the Ward but does some tree trimming on request for low-hanging branches. Service for low-hanging branches obstructing sidewalks and intersections can be requested by calling the 45th ward office directly.
- The 45th Ward's shred event is scheduled on June 3 at Hoyne Bank on Milwaukee Avenue, paper and electronics will be accepted.
- Other upcoming events include catalytic converter painting and women's yoga events; the details can

be found in the ward newsletter or by contacting the 45th Ward office.

Next, Alderman Gardiner introduced **Greg Wagner**, **Chicago Bureau of Forestry**. Greg took the stage and shared the following highlights from Chicago Streets and Sanitation new tree trimming program that kicked off this spring.

The Forestry Bureau completed tree trimming until April 2023 via requests submitted via 311.

A couple of events, such as the Emerald Ash Borer, which resulted in a mass die-off of the city's Ash trees, and the derecho that swept through the city in 2021, caused the department to fall behind on tree-trimming requests. With the shift to a grid system for completing tree service, the Forestry Bureau can now be more efficient. This new system aims to trim every tree in the city in a five year cycle.

Emergency requests are addressed immediately and can still be submitted via 311. An emergency is dictated by a damaged tree that poses a danger to public safety (hanging over a sidewalk/street).

The biggest roadblock for the Bureau completing this essential service is people not moving their vehicles when tree service parking restrictions are posted. This drastically slows down forestry crews.

In addition to trimming, the Forestry Bureau provides new parkway trees by request. New trees can be requested via 311. When a resident's tree request is fulfilled, Forestry will drop off a door hanger at your house to notify you of the scheduled planting.

Before wrapping up his presentation, Greg accepted questions from attendees.

- **Q:** If the Forest Bureau cuts down a tree, will they grind the stump?
- **A:** Forestry contract with a private company that grinds within 4-6 weeks of tree removal. Most of the tree debris will be removed, but the department does not restore grass or other plantings.
- **Q:** Some of the blocks in Old Irving don't have alleys. Who do we call for tree service behind our homes?
- **A:** ComEd has an easement for their utility poles and lines behind homes. They are responsible for tree removal within the easement.

- **Q:** If a low-hanging branch is in front of my neighbor's house, will the Alderman's office trim it?
- **A:** The 45th will ask the neighbor but then cut the branch
- Q: Who do we call for a tree emergency?
- A: Call 311—keyword "emergency."

Greg Wagner and the Alderman wrapped up Q&A and thanked OIPA for the invitation

OIPA President Adrienne Chan wrapped up the meeting by sharing the following announcements.

Call 911 while the incident you are reporting is in progress and the on-site presence of a police officer is necessary to help resolve the matter (e.g., burglary in progress, incident involving injuries, quieting loud neighbors, etc.). You should contact 311 if the incident you are reporting has occurred and the offender is gone from the scene.

Use 311 to find information, request non-emergency services, or report non-emergency issues. You can call 311 to find out what Police District and beat you live in, as well as the date, time and location of your next beat meeting. Contacting 311 gives you easy access to non-emergency police services, from filing police reports to talking to police personnel in your district.



IPHS Images Sought for ABC News Piece

n mid-April, OIPA was contacted by Jared Kofsky, an associate producer with the ABC News Investigative Unit in New York, regarding photos he had seen on the Irving Park Historical Society (IPHS) Facebook page dating back to 2017. The search across the internet for content regarding aging U. S. water infrastructure had taken his team to the IPHS site, and he inquired about the usage of the images for a segment they were creating.

The photos of some of the neighborhood's oldest wooden water pipes were taken during the summer

of 2017 by IPHS members **Terry McGuire** and **Matt Krecun**, as the city water department unearthed them along the 3800-3900 blocks of Kedvale and Keeler. The settlement area contains an artesian well and predated annexation to the city (1889) by nineteen years. It's thought that these pipes [may be] the earliest pipes used by the city to connect to its main water supply in Lake Michigan (about 4-5 miles to the east of the area). The IPHS went to work digging out the original images and sending them along, with some brief historical information, to Jared to be included in his piece.

Roughly two weeks later, the piece was ready as part of ABC News' Steve Osunsami's report on regional water issues and included in "The Power of Water Initiative" series for Earth Month coverage. It was scheduled to appear on ABCNews.com, ABCNL Prime, and the ABC News Live Stream, and was uploaded to the ABC News YouTube channel, where over 105,000 of 14.3M followers have viewed it. The segment is titled "Waterproof, Louisiana Mayor on Water Crisis: 'We're Falling Off of a Cliff' (https://bit.ly/ABC-Water, The Old Irving Park wooden waterpipe images appear around 3:36 minutes.).

SALSA FRESCA CHICKEN BAKE

Ingredients

- · 2 lbs chicken breast, boneless and skinless
- 1/4 teaspoon cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, divided
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon red chili pepper flakes
- 2 cups diced grape or Roma tomatoes
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- · 1/3 cup chopped jalapeño
- 1/2 cup fresh chopped cilantro
- 1/2 lime, juiced
- 1 cup shredded Mozzarella

Instructions

- 1. To make the salsa fresca chicken bake: Preheat the oven to 400°F (200°C). Chop chicken breasts into small pieces. In a salad bowl, combine tomato, onion, jalapeño, cilantro, and lime juice with 1/4 teaspoon salt.
- Arrange the chicken pieces flat in a large baking dish and season evenly with cumin, garlic, red chili pepper flakes, salt, and pepper. Give a quick stir to combine chicken evenly with seasoning. Cover chicken pieces with the diced tomatoes, onion, and jalapeño, then top with shredded Mozzarella
- 3. Bake the salsa fresca chicken on the middle rack for 25–30 minutes or until chicken is cooked through and no longer pink (internal temperature of 165° F/74°C). Garnish the salsa fresca chicken bake with more chopped cilantro, and serve hot with your favorite side dish like rice, bulgur, cauliflower rice, pasta, tortillas... Enjoy!
