Treasurer's Report

Lynn Ankney presented the January Treasurer Report. Receipts for Keep OIP Clean of \$1,979.04 and \$1,098.71 of advertising revenue led to a strong month for income. Checks cashed for OIPA's charitable giving in January totaled \$1,100. The final disbursement for the membership database development rounded out the month's expenses. A motion to approve the Treasurer's report was made by Meredith, seconded by Michael, and approved by the Board.

 Database Project – The new OIPA membership database is up and running. The Board is working on identifying and resolving a few small glitches, but even in its infancy, this new tool is already an amazing improvement to our member management processes.

The Board decided to invite the NM rep to one of our meetings to gauge if it might be a good forum for them to present to OIPA neighbors. Separately, OIPA directors plan to meet with Northwestern to discuss advertising/ sponsorship/partnership ideas.
- OIPA directors plan to connect with Clarendale Six Corners in February to discuss advertising in the OIPA newsletter

- Board asked Alderwoman Cruz, who agreed to share the business' Plan of Operations.
- 3800 N Milwaukee Sports Complex parking violations: The Board brought it to Alderwoman Cruz's attention that this is still an ongoing problem. The Alderwoman shared that her office is working with the property owner, tenants and city departments to enforce parking restrictions and find solutions for the patrons of the sports complex to discourage parking in the bike lanes and other restricted parking areas on Milwaukee Ave.

 4910 W Addison - St. Bartholomew Catholic School: There is a plan to convert the convent and school into a shelter that will house around 350 migrants. Alderwoman Cruz shared that the city and archdioceses are working with their partners to ready the buildings for final approval and move-in.

· 39th Ward Report:

- 4342 N Elston - Happy Day Tavern: OIPA issued a letter of support to temporarily lift the moratorium preventing applications for new liquor licenses in the area. Lifting the moratorium would enable the owners to move forward with the license application process and begin the rigorous vetting process for new taverns in the city.

45th Ward Report:

 The Board discussed plans to organize a tour of the new apartments at the location of the former Six Corners Sears store.

Beautification Report

 Cleaning & Beautification - In support of OIPA's neighborhood beautification efforts, Director Dan William proposed hosting an Old Irving Park Association fundraising dinner at Community Tavern. Funds raised at this event could be used to expand Keep OIP Clean's work of regular cleanings to larger beautification efforts. Over the past couple of months, Dan has gathered information related to availability of space, cost, and community interest, and presented his findings to the rest of the Board.

There was a lot of discussion among Directors about what this event could look like and how to organize and execute it successfully. Ultimately the Board decided to proceed with a fundraising event in Fall 2024. Over the next few months, we will plan and organize OIPA's first benefit at Community Tayern. More information to come!

- Viaducts A spring cleaning of the viaducts will be scheduled in April or May and will be paid for from OIPA's Keep OIP Clean funds.
- Tree Planting The Board is working to organize a 2024 tree planting with Openlands. Watch future newsletters, OIPA eBlasts, and your front porch for parkway tree planting volunteer opportunities.



Summarized Minutes of the General Meeting on February 12, 2024, 7 p.m.

Meeting started at 7:10 p.m.

he February OIPA General Members Meeting was called to order by OIPA President Michael Cannon. The roughly 30 attendees mingling with friends and neighbors quieted and took their seats. Michael introduced himself and then yielded the floor to Dana Fritz, a representative from Congressman Mike Quigley's office. Dana introduced himself and shared a couple of updates from the Congressman, which included news that funds had been secured to install an elevator at Irving Park YMCA! Dana reminded attendees about constituent services that the Congressional Office provides and thanked everyone for the opportunity to share.

President Cannon thanked Dana and the Congressman's office for attending and introduced the presenters for the evening, Jenny Kotz and Sally Weigel. Jenny, a neighbor in adjacent Independence Park, volunteered to attend the February meeting and share her experience adding a solar energy system to her home. Sally, a representative from Certasun, a solar panel vendor/installer located in Buffalo Grove, Illinois, joined us to present additional details about solar energy and what to expect when installing solar panels on your roof to generate electricity. For the next 45 minutes, Sally shared some of the benefits of solar energy. Jenny and a few other neighbors in attendance shared their experiences with installed solar energy systems.

A few of the benefits of adding solar to your home that were shared were:

- Achieving a 100% offset of your electric bill (but for taxes; no avoiding those)
- A quick return on investment, roughly 7.5 years, with an expected 45-year system lifespan
- There are no caps on the amount of energy you can produce, with ComEd crediting you for energy produced in excess of consumption and sent back to the grid (net metering)
- Generous federal and state of Illinois incentives through 2024 for installing a solar system (30% federal tax credit and 25-45% state rebate based on expected energy production)

During the presentation, Sally and Jenny welcomed questions from attendees. A few of the questions included:

- Q: How long does the process to install a solar system take from start to completion?
- A: Roughly 90 days
- Q: Can a solar system be installed in a multi-unit building?
- **A:** Yes, but there are additional considerations for buildings larger than two units.
- Q: Can solar energy be generated year-round on cold days?
- **A:** Yes, as long as the sun is out, you can produce solar energy.
- Q: Can solar panels be installed on flat roofs and garages?
- A: Yes
- Q: Is there a fee for Certasun to provide a solar consultation for your home
- **A:** No, Certasun can virtually assess your home solar potential and will virtually meet with you to review findings and make recommendations.

Sally from Certasun wrapped up her presentation and invited additional questions following the meeting.

Before Michael Cannon wrapped up the meeting, he asked if there were any first-time attendees. There were two new households represented.

The meeting concluded at 8 p.m.

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TIPS FROM A NEIGHBOR | Gardening in OIP





GARDENERS RESIST THE URGE

to start Early

fter a relatively mild winter like we've just had in Chicago, we gardeners are more than eager to get out in the garden and get to work clearing and cleaning, but I urge you to hold off a bit—for now, anyway. Winter and early spring in the garden are basically a series of freeze-and-thaw cycles. These cycles create tiny air spaces called "pores" in the soil, essential for healthy plants. Soil is a living organism and, as such, needs oxygen to exist. Without adequate oxygen, plants become waterlogged, and the roots of plants will rot.

If you dig or even walk on your beds too early when the soil is wet, you will damage your soil by eliminating these air spaces. If you must walk in your garden, lay down a wood plank and walk on that instead.

Resisting the urge to clean up your beds too early

would be best. Even though we all are anxious to see what is starting to grow, it is better to wait.

Hopefully, you left the leaves on your flower beds last fall. These leaves help to regulate the temperature of the soil. Removing this organic cover will expose tender shoots to our unpredictable spring weather. We have had snow as late as May in years past. The leaves will decompose independently and give essential nutrients back into the soil.

As consistently warm weather arrives, you can expose the crowns of the plants but do not put the leaves in the trash. Leave the material around the roots of your plants instead. If you can live with the look of the decomposing leaves for a few extra weeks until the plants leaf out, your garden will thank you for being more productive.



IPGC has scheduled three workdays for members to tend our community garden at Irving Park Rd. and Tripp Ave. (across from


Eris Brewery). Cleanups will be led by our resident guru, **Mike Basile**. Dates are as follows:

OIPA Board Members Tour the New 6 Corners Lofts

n Friday, February 9, OIPA Board of Directors members had the opportunity to tour 6 Corners Lofts, the new Novak development (aka "former Sears") at Six Corners. Jake Paschen, Executive Vice President of Novak Development Company, guided us through a 90-minute tour that spanned the entirety of the six-story building.

We started our tour on the building's rooftop to take in the skyline and surrounding neighborhood views. The residents will enjoy outdoor amenities, including a pool, firepits, built-in BBQ grills, and a dog walk park. Inside the penthouse floor are two party rooms, a fitness center, and a co-working space.

Novak outfitted the building with unique artwork as well as relics from the original building.



We toured over a dozen apartment layouts on floors 2–5. The apartments have similar finishes but come in various sizes and

configurations, from studios and convertibles to two-bedroom, two-bath layouts. All dwellings have in-unit washer/dryer units, closets, and full kitchens. Some units have loft areas. and some have decks or patios. In addition to rent. tenants will pay an extra fee (based on unit square footage), including heating and cooling, and high-speed Internet, Tenants can also opt to rent either an outdoor or indoor car space for an added fee.

We had a quick peek at the forthcoming 45,000-square-foot Target store on the ground floor of the 6-story building, which looks very close to opening. A remaining 5,000 square foot retail space along Cicero Avenue is yet to be occupied.

We are pleased to welcome this addition to our neighborhood and look forward to seeing it occupied by new neighbors at Six Corners!




"The Power of Play" — Ron Anderson, Executive Director



Reusable Bags Policy

Beginning this month, the Pantry requires clients to bring their reusable bags for most food (except where required, such as with meat options). Each client will be given several reusable bags during their first visit in March or later, but after that, they will have to either bring reusable bags or use emptied boxes to take away their groceries. No one-use plastic bags will be available to bag regular groceries.

Our goal is to aid the environment while reducing costs and making use of the reusable bags that most families own already. Please note that we are not asking for donations of reusable bags.


