Six Corners Yesterday & Today

s the finishing touches are put on the new retail/residential building at the northwest corner of Irving Park Rd. at Cicero Avenue—formerly Sears Roebuck & Company's \$1 million store that opened in 1938—we take a look to see that corner's evolution.

During the days when the main settlement in the area was the little village of Jefferson, the Irving/Cicero corner had been the property of T. Fay before

and during the Civil War. Shortly after that, T. Fay sold the property to James Smith, an English immigrant by way of Canada, who built his farmhouse, barns, and eventually other family dwellings there during the late nineteenth century. The Smiths started a dairy and later opened the first small grocery store at that intersection. Sensing opportunity in real estate, the next generation built, among other things, the two-story brick Smith Block in the early 20th century, which still stands just to the east at the corner near today's Marketplace.

Business interests in the Six Corners formed by the three-way intersection of Irving Park Boulevard and Milwaukee and Cicero Avenues began in 1841.

In 1845, Chester Dickinson purchased Sutherland's Inn. Dickinson's Inn and Tavern (located at the current intersection of Milwaukee and Belle Plaine Avenues) was also home to the local post office and interim town hall. The tavern served as a central hub of activity for Jefferson Township after it was formally formed in 1873. The town hall for Jefferson Township

was built on the site in 1862, and the area was annexed into the city of Chicago in 1889.

Increased commercialization started a chain of changes at the intersection during the 1920s. Despite residents' preservation efforts, 70+-year-old buildings like the Jefferson Town Hall (built in 1862) and the Chester Dickinson Inn and Tavern were razed in 1929. Newer buildings offered businesses, services, and entertainment to the increasing population moving to the new Portage Park area. During these years, a newly created Northwest Chamber of Commerce declared that a "great department store" was necessary as an anchor to enhance retail opportunities for the area and the smaller shops. In the spring of 1937, the Smith farm property was sold, and planning for the new Sears store began. The Sears department store, built in 1938, was designed by the Chicagobased architectural firm Nimmons, Carr & Wright and was the seventh of the large Sears stores to open in Chicago. It featured "monolith concrete" specially treated to provide new and interesting

surface textures; contemporary design innovations included an extension of display windows to allow greater sales space on the first floor, intervals of glass columns so shoppers could shop "by daylight," and a 30-ft high glass stage "super-show window" on the second floor. The otherwise windowless building was air-conditioned, with escalators to all floors, and had a 360-car parking lot.

Thus, the current iteration of the northeast corner at Six Corners will again be living space and shopping—mirroring the activity at the corner a century ago.

OIPA GENERAL MFFTING RFPORT



Summarized Minutes of the General Meeting on March 11, 2024, 7 p.m.

Meeting started at 7 p.m.

ust after 7 p.m., OIPA Board member Adrienne Chan dimmed the room lights for the upcoming presentation at the OIPA General Meeting and introduced tonight's speaker, Susan Casey, Program Director, Composting and Food Waste of the Recycling and Material Management program of Streets and Sanitation.

Susan came to speak with us about the City of Chicago's new Food Scrap Drop-Off program. Below is a summary of her presentation:

 The Department of Streets and Sanitation (DSS) manages garbage, recycling, and yard waste collection for Chicago residents in 1-4 unit buildings, which equates to 625,000 households.

- The Guiding documents for waste reduction and climate actions informing the Food Scrap Drop Off program include:
 - 1.) The City of Chicago Waste Strategy Materials Management Strategies document and
 - 2.) 2022 CAP ChicagoClimate Action Plan
- ~40% of all food purchased is wasted (nationwide, without composting programs).
- In 2023, DSS collected 877,666 tons of materials. ~ Twenty percent of household waste is food waste (175,533 tons).
- Composting keeps food scraps out of landfills, reduces harmful greenhouse gas emissions, and recycles nutrients that enrich soil.

Summarized Minutes of the General Meeting on March 11, 2024

 - To reduce food waste and the methane gas food decomposing in landfills, as a solution (composting) the City launched the Food Scrap Drop-off Program in October 2023.
 - All Chicago residents are invited to participate.
 The service is for household food scraps only, not restaurants. There are 17 locations across the Chicago.
 - Get more information and sign up at ChicagoRecycles.org.
 - The Food Scrap Drop-Off locations are open daily from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
 - Report any issues to dsscomposting@ cityofchicago.org or call 312-744-2413.
 - · Results as of late Feb 2024
 - Over 4200 households have signed up for the program thus far.
 - 67 tons of food scraps were diverted for composting.
 - 43.8 MTC02e of greenhouse gas emissions prevented (equivalent to preventing the emissions from burning almost 5,000 gallons of gasoline).
 - Other DSS services, pilots, and exploratory programs:
 - Free yard waste pickup call 311 to schedule a pickup of your yard waste contained in brown paper waste bags.
 - Holiday tree recycling is offered for two weeks in January. Trees are chipped into mulch.
 - Pumpkin Smash [events] Composting

- pumpkins the week after Halloween (reference: https://www.chicago.gov/city/en/sites/chicago-recycles/home/pumpkinsmash.html).
- Blue Cart Recycling Updates: visit
 Chicagorecycles.org to see the journey of recyclables from pickup to it's end state.
- Stay tuned for information on a backyard compost bin giveaway, set to launch in Spring 2024 for fruit/vegetable composting in your backyard.
- Community Garden Composting Pilot Program:
 Six community gardens across the city
 have a 3-bin compost system in place
 during the pilot.
- DSS is exploring options for a residential collection of food scraps and yard waste.

- **Q:** What happens to the food scraps?
- A: The scraps are collected each day and moved to a large transfer facility before reaching the Harbor View Composting facility, managed by Whole Earth Compost in Chicago's South Side. The food scraps are mixed with yard waste, placed in long windrows, and processed over the course of about three months. The finished compost is sold as a soil amendment.
- **Q:** How can the City accept things like meat that are usually unacceptable in a backyard compost bin?
- **A:** The City's composting reaches higher temperatures, allowing for proper decomposition.



When to Call 311 vs. 911

Call 911 while the incident you are reporting is in progress and the on-site presence of a police officer is necessary to help resolve the matter (e.g., burglary in progress, incident involving

injuries, quieting loud neighbors, etc.). You should contact 311 if the incident you are reporting has occurred and the offender is gone from the scene.

Use 311 to find information, request non-emergency services, or report non-emergency issues. You can call 311 to find out what Police District and beat you live in, as well as the date, time and location of your next beat meeting. Contacting 311 gives you easy access to non-emergency police services, from filing police reports to talking to police personnel in your district.






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MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

I am grateful for the opportunity to have served on the OIPA Board for the last 4 years. And now it is time for me to step down as a board member to focus on my family and career.

I joined the Board in November 2019 and within a few months, our lives turned upside down from the Covid-19 pandemic. Feeling connected during that time was difficult. But we found a way in Old Irving Park. We introduced the "We heart OIP" yard signs in spring 2020 to show our unity. We promoted outdoor home decorating contests for Halloween and winter holidays as a fun way to get outside when we couldn't gather inside. We started coloring pages in the OIPA newsletter and encouraged folks to display their colorful artwork in their windows for others to see during their neighborhood walks. And to add some levity during a difficult time, I started a corny jokes column in the OIPA newsletter.

As the Covid-19 restrictions lifted, we were able to start gathering in person again. One of my fondest in-person memories of my tenure on the OIPA Board was rededicating Kolmar Park in honor of poet Gertrud Kolmar, whose life was cut short when she was murdered in the Holocaust. Rededicating the park in Gertrud's honor brought so many of us together across Chicago and beyond. Though Gertrud Kolmar did not visit Chicago during her lifetime, she, her family, and anyone who has faced bigotry or injustice will always have a place to belong—in our neighborhood.

hicago will see an influx of cicadas later this spring in what is being described as a rare double-brood event. The last time two broods of cicadas emerged in the same year was 1803, according to NBC News Science.

What does that mean? Across the Midwest, beginning in late April through June, billions of these winged insects will surface from underground looking for a mate. And they won't be quiet about it. Decibel levels are said to be about the same as a lawn mower or chainsaw.

The good news is that they are basically harmless, according to the EPA. They're not looking to bite or sting you. They won't hurt your flowers or plants, and if your pet eats a small number, there is no need to worry.

Our local chickadees, bluebirds, cardinals, bats, spiders, and squirrels will be enjoying the feast. Added bonus: Cicadas can aerate lawns when they emerge and then add nutrients to the soil as they decompose.

But if you have a small tree in your yard, the EPA recommends you protect it by wrapping it in mesh or netting with 1/4-in. or smaller openings. This will prevent the cicadas from depositing their eggs in small tree branches. They cannot harm larger, more established trees.

A Deeper Dive into Insects

Debbie Maher, president of the Irving Park Garden Club, has invited James P. Rowan, naturalist and photographer, to present "Don't Squash That Bug!" at our April general meeting. As we work to restore

habitat and regenerate biodiversity by adding native plants to our own backyards, we will encourage and encounter more insects so important to our ecosystems.

This program will provide a visual survey of some of the beneficial as well as invasive insects and spiders found in our homes, gardens, and natural areas. We'll learn about a few exotic species as well.

This meeting takes place Thursday, April 18, at 7:00 p.m. at St. John's Episcopal Church, 3857 N. Kostner Ave. Meetings are for members only, but you can join at the door for our annual dues of \$25.00 per household.

Pantry Celebrates 40th Anniversary

This month marks the 40th Anniversary of the Irving Park Community Food Pantry, and we appreciate all the support we have received through the years. Special celebrations for volunteers, supporters, and the entire community will be announced later (as the weather warms).

The Pantry was opened in 1984 through the efforts of **Laila Duncan**, an Irving Park United Methodist Church (IPUMC) member at 3801 N. Keeler, working out of a closet in the church's basement utility room. It expanded into the entire space, adding refrigerators, freezers, offices, and a large delivery area.



Our executive director, **John Psiharis**, joined in 2008 and helped the Pantry expand its service area, operating hours, and food suppliers. We moved to the Emanuel United Methodist Church at 4256 N. Ridgeway Ave. in September 2019 after IPUMC was sold.

We remained open throughout the worst COVID pandemic in 2020, providing food to as many as 200 families a week as other nearby pantries could not remain open. The Greater Chicago Food Depository named the Pantry a "Pandemic Hero" in September 2021 for our volunteers' relentless work to overcome every challenge thrown at us.

Our numbers returned to normal levels by 2022, only to rise again late last year as migrants and other people in need moved into our service area of the 60618 and 60641 ZIP codes. These days, we're providing food to about 130 families per week compared to about 80 per week in 2022.

We are proud of our service to everyone in need of food to help their families, as well as our programs to provide pet food, spring baskets, school supplies, coats, holiday food, and children's gifts throughout the year. And we appreciate everyone who has supported our efforts for the past 40 years!
